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

 Larger proposal assistance; Individual assistance as capacity allowed





Texas A&M University


- Land-grant, sea-grant and space-grant university located in College Station, Texas
- Opened in 1876 flagship university of The Texas A&M System
- 2016 enrollment 67,000
 - 77% Undergraduate
 - 23% Graduate
- Faculty 4,971
 - ~3,000 PI Eligible
- AAU member
- FY15 expenditures exceeded \$866M
- Ranks 9th among US public universities (HERD)

The RDS ethos...

The Research Development Services group at Texas A&M University has a simple mission:

Customer Service





How does our mission affect how we work?

- 1) For RDS staff, the needs of faculty and researchers is paramount.
- 2) We answer each request for assistance within our mission with a "YES!" (there is one exception)
- 3) We prioritize faculty consultation above other tasks.
- 4) We use every opportunity to be visible and create productive relationships with faculty and other researchers.





Faculty/Researchers Needs Are Our TOP Priority!

How does this prioritization appear to faculty in our work?

- 1. Turnaround times are fast. Often within 24-48 hours.
- 2. Meeting faculty where they are. (Convenience)
- 3. Staying knowledgeable and up to date regarding funding agency requirements.
- 4. Going the extra mile when deadlines are pressing.





Being "Yes" women and men.

- 1) Regardless of the type of faculty/researcher request we respond with either:
 - 1) Yes! (in nearly every case).
 - 2) Yes!, but....
 - 1) Teach to fish rather than give a fish
 - Refer to outside proposal development consultancies if appropriate.





Prioritizing Consulting Above All Else

In addition to faculty research development, RDS staff also program manage:

- 1) The PESCA seed grant program
- 2) The Arts & Humanities Fellows Program
- 3) The CONACYT international grant program
- 4) Many other non-consulting related activities

But:

- Faculty Research Development Consultation always comes first!
- Effective prioritization is key!





Visibility to Faculty and Researchers

Efforts are consistently made to increase the visibility of RDS staff to faculty and researchers including:

- A slate of six "Coffee and Research Discussion" panels in different geographic regions of the main campus spring and fall.
- 2) Several dozen workshops and seminars led by RDS research development personnel.
- 3) Dedicated NSF and NIH proposal writing groups.
- 4) Promotion of faculty research development resources at the department, college and university levels.





The Payoff....

As we all know, word travels slowly through faculties across an enormous campus like Texas A&M University, but it does travel.

- 1) Faculty talk to colleagues about the assistance they've received with their proposals and where to go to get it.
- 2) Every day, faculty email the RDS staff looking for all sorts of assistance and get told "Yes, I can help you!"
- 3) It would only take one no, or one slow, incomplete, or incorrect response to a request for assistance to undo the reputation for excellence we've built so far.
- 4) Our goal is a 100% satisfied client base.
